## Sexual Victimization in Juvenile Facilities Reported by Youth, 2008-09<sup>1</sup>

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## **National Context**

According to a new study released by the Justice Department on January 7<sup>th</sup> 2010, an estimated **12 percent** of adjudicated youth in state operated and large locally or privately operated juvenile facilities reported experiencing one or more incidents of sexual victimization<sup>2</sup> by another youth or facility staff in the past 12 months or since admission, if less than 12 months. About 2.6 percent of youth reported an incident involving another youth, and 10.3 percent reported an incident involving facility staff.

About 4.3 percent of youth reported having sex or sexual contact with staff as a result of force 6.4 percent of youth reported sexual contact with staff without any force, threat, or other explicit form of coercion. Among youth victimized by facility staff, more than two-third (69 percent) did not report any force, threat of force, or offers of favors, protection, drugs, or alcohol to engage in the sexual activity. Approximately 95 percent of all youth reporting staff sexual misconduct said they had been victimized by female facility staff. In 2008, 42 percent of staff in juvenile facilities under state jurisdiction were female.

Males were more likely than females to report sexual activity with facility staff (10.8 percent compared to 4.7 percent). Black youth (11.9%) reported a slightly higher rate of sexual victimization by facility staff than white youth (9.7%) and Hispanic youth (8.1%).

Rates of staff sexual misconduct with youth were higher in state operated facilities (10.9%) than in non-state facilities (7.9%). Male-only facilities had the highest rates of staff sexual misconduct (11.3%). Reports of staff-on-youth sexual victimizations increased with the length of time a youth had been in the facility. An estimated 14.6% of youth who had been in the facility 12 months or more, compared to 8.3% of youth who had been in the facility for less than 6 months, said they had sexual contact with facility staff.

Nearly half of the youth victimized by another youth reported they had experienced physical force or threat of force (46 percent), 30 percent had been offered favors or protection, and 17 percent had been given drugs or alcohol. Nearly 20 percent of youth sexually victimized by another youth reported being injured in the incident, compared to five percent of youth victimized by staff. Females were more likely than males to report forced sexual activity with another youth (9.1 percent compared to 2.0 percent). White youth (4.4%) were more likely than black youth (2.1%) and Hispanic youth (0.9%) to report sexual victimization by another youth.

Female-only facilities had the highest rates of youth-on-youth sexual victimization (11.0%).

Rates of reported sexual victimization varied among youth:

- 10.8% of males and 4.7% of females reported sexual activity with facility staff.
- 9.1% of females and 2.0% of males reported unwanted sexual activity with other youth.
- Youth with a sexual orientation other than heterosexual reported significantly higher rates of sexual victimization by another youth (12.5%) compared to heterosexual youth (1.3%).
- Youth who had experienced any prior sexual assault were more than twice as likely to report sexual victimization in the current facility (24.1%), compared to those with no sexual assault history (10.1%).

Facilities in which youth were held an average of less than 5 months had the lowest rates of sexual victimization (7.4%), compared to facilities in which youth were held for longer periods (12.7% in facilities with an average of 5 to 6 months and 14.2% in facilities with an average of 7 to 12 months).

Overall, 91 percent of youth in the facilities in the survey were males; 9 percent were females. The National Survey of Youth in Custody was conducted between June 2008 and April 2009 in 166 state-owned or operated juvenile facilities and 29 locally or privately operating facilities, yielding 9.198 completed interviews from adjudicated youth.

Among adjudicated youths who had been victimized, 92% were males reporting sexual activity with female staff: an additional 2.5% were males reporting sexual activity with both female and male staff. Among adjudicated youths who reported that force had been used in their sexual victimization, 86% were males who had sexual activity with female staff. 91% of all adjudicated youth held in the sampled facilities were male.

Note: In facilities covered by the NYSC, an estimated 91% of adjudicated youth were male. Based on available data from 43 states and the District of Columbia, 42% of staff in juvenile facilities under state jurisdiction on October 22, 2008, were female.

## **Illinois Context**

According to the National Survey of Youth in Custody, male adjudicated youth in the Joliet Youth Center report experiencing the highest level of sexual victimization by another youth or facility staff at 13.9 percent. This is followed by 11.8 percent of male adjudicated youth at Harrisburg Youth Center who report one or more incidents of sexual victimization by another youth or facility staff.

11.4 of female adjudicated youth at Warrenville Youth Center reported one or more incidents of sexual victimization by another youth or facility staff.

Two juvenile facilities in Illinois had no reported incidents of sexual victimization: the Chicago Youth Center and Murphyboro Youth Center.

In keeping with national statistics, it appears that adjudicated female youth (11.4%) at Warrenville were significantly more likely to report sexual victimization by another youth compared to their male counterparts. They were also much more likely to report that these incidents were nonconsensual (6.8 percent). Among adjudicated male youth in Illinois, the young men (4.1 percent) housed at Kewanee Youth Center were most likely to report being victimized by another youth.
